

Collection overview

In 1902, a group of residents of Holyoke, Mass., secured a charter for the Holyoke Home for Aged People, wishing to do "something of permanent good for their city" and provide a "blessing to the homeless." Opened in March 1911 on two acres of land donated by William Loomis, the Holyoke Home provided long-term care of the elderly, and grew slowly for its first half century. After changing its name to Loomis House in 1969, in honor of the benefactor, Loomis began slowly to expand, moving to its present location in 1981 upon construction of the first continuing care retirement community in the Commonwealth. In 1988, the Board acquired a 27-acre campus in South Hadley on which it established Loomis Village; in 1999, it became affiliated with the Applewood community in Amherst; and in 2009, it acquired Reeds Landing in Springfield.

The Loomis Communities Records offer more than a century perspective on elder care and the growth of retirement communities in western Massachusetts. The collection includes a nearly complete run of the minutes of the Board of Directors from 1902 to the present, an assortment administrative and financial records, and some documentation of the experience of the communities' residents, with the bulk of materials dating from the 1980s to the present. An extensive series of oral histories with residents of Loomis Village was conducted in 2010.

Background on Loomis Communities

In 1883, a picnicking group of five female friends in Holyoke, MA slowly blossomed into an outing and social group of over fifty women. Wishing to do "something of permanent good for their city" and provide a "blessing to the homeless," the so called Rain or Shine Club came up with the idea of gathering support and money for an institution to house and care for the old and infirm and to promote benevolent work in the community, Fifty-five women eventually signed the petition of incorporation for the Holyoke Home for Aged People, and the first meeting of the corporation was held October 6, 1902. Funding for the institution and an endowment was raised from throughout the community, including funds from a fair run by the group, and donations from the Holyoke Water Power Company, The Lyman Mills, William and Joseph Skinner, Frank Beebe, Mrs. Cyrus L. Frink, Charles E. Crevier, and J. P. Morgan.

The Holyoke Home, designed by the Chicopee architect James Clough for the purpose of housing the elderly, opened in March 1911 on two acres of land donated by philanthropist and widower William Stiles Loomis, whose wife had been in the Rain or Shine Club and had wishes of aiding the homeless and aged population of Holyoke. The Home provided long-term care of the elderly, famously for both women and men, and grew slowly for its first half century.

After changing its name to Loomis House in 1969, in honor of the benefactor, Loomis began slowly to expand, moving to its present location in 1981 upon construction of the first continuing care retirement community in the Commonwealth. In 1988, the Board acquired a 27-acre campus in South Hadley on which it established Loomis Village; in 1999, it became affiliated with the Applewood community in Amherst; and in 2009, it acquired Reeds Landing in Springfield. With over a century of changes and innovative work in residential and health care services, Loomis Communities continues to impact the nursing home industry today with its network of independent- and assisted-living apartments, units, and focus on creating a person-centered long-term care community.

Scope of collection

The Loomis Communities Records offer more than a century perspective on elder care and the growth of retirement communities in western Massachusetts. The collection includes a nearly complete run of the minutes of the Board of Directors from 1909 to the present, an assortment administrative and financial records, and some documentation of the experience of the communities' residents, with the bulk of materials dating from the 1980s to the present. An extensive series of oral histories with residents of Loomis Village was conducted in 2010.

Series descriptions

Series 1: Subject Files

1911-2010 (*bulk*1980-2000) 4.75 boxes (6.75 linear feet)

This series includes correspondence, reports, clippings, notes, lists, blueprints, advertisements and other documentation of various activities and groups associated with Loomis Communities. It is organized thematically, and includes materials related to admissions, care, services, staffing, development, finances, planning, marketing, residents, and other elder care facilities associated with Loomis. Subject are arranged alphabetically, although several subjects, such as development and marketing, are arranged chronologically to assist understanding of the changes of the Loomis buildings, residencies, and outreach strategies over time.

Series 2: Administrative

1909-2014 (*bulk*1980-2000)

5 boxes (7.5 linear feet)

This series documents the administrative history of Loomis Communities, all the way back to its time as Holyoke Home for Aged People. There is a nearly complete run of the minutes and roll call of the Board of Directors from 1909 to the early 2000s, annual reports from the 1980s through 2014, and documentation from the numerous administrative and resident committees and groups in charge of administration, planning, and life at Loomis.

Series 3: Publications

1985-2015

.25 boxes (.5 linear feet)

This series includes publications and newsletters put out by residents and administration at Loomis Communities over the years.

Series 4: Visual Materials

1935-2005 (*bulk*1980-1999) 1 box (1 linear foot)

This series consists of photographs and slides of Loomis Communities residents, facilities, and events, particularly on holidays and other special occasions.

This series includes 32 oral history interviews conducted with residents and administrators from Loomis Communities in 2010.
